Scott Stallmann is the 24-year-old son of Nick and Dianna Stallmann of Sheldon, IA. He has one sister, Kyla. In January 2019, Scott was diagnosed with a rare and aggressive form of cancer known as NUT midline carcinoma. After well-tolerated chemoradiation treatments at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN, in the spring of 2019, Scott has had metastatic recurrence of his cancer to his bones and various organs of his body. Though there is no standard course of treatment for this typically incurable cancer, he is presently enrolled in a clinical trial at the MD Anderson Cancer Research Center in Houston, TX.

Scott graduated from the Sheldon High School in 2013. He also graduated from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion, SD, in the spring of 2018, and planned to depart the United States as an English teacher in the Peace Corps. He was prevented from service due to his disease. Scott and members of his family travel back and forth between Sheldon and Houston approximately 3 times each month, for Scott to participate in the clinical trial. In addition to student loan payments, the Stallmann family has incurred food


and travel expenses throughout the spring and summer.

"The support from AgriVision Equipment and Northwest Missouri State is top notch. They have a good thing going," said Shughart. "Camps like this should definitely be put on more often."

"The cultures at Northwest Missouri State University and AgriVision Equipment very much align," said Ford. "We're both staunch advocates of agriculture who want to ensure that ag remains vibrant in the future and is seen as a career choice for our best and brightest young people. We want to get them excited at a young age."

An AgriVision Equipment representative serves on Northwest Missouri State University's professional advisory committee. "AgriVision Equipment has been so good for us. They are truly a partner that strengthens who we are as a university and what we do," said Barr.

"We've worked to come up with other ways to strengthen our partnership with them," added Barr. This included meeting with AgriVision Equipment's board of directors to discuss curriculum helpful to the ag equipment industry and holding a faculty retreat at AgriVision Equipment's Red Oak, Iowa facility. "It was an eye-opening experience."

Northwest Missouri State University recently created an ag dealership management minor. "We want to do what we can to help get students into dealerships," said Barr, who added that one component of this minor would be an internship requirement at a co-op or equipment dealership.



### PRECISION AG EXPO | SHELDON, IOWA

This summer, AgriVision Equipment also partnered with Northwest Iowa Community College to hold an inaugural one-day Precision Ag Expo in Sheldon, Iowa. "This event came about pretty much the same way as our Precision Agriculture Summer Academy at Northwest Missouri State," said Ford. "I was attending a meeting when I struck up a conversation with a representative from Northwest Iowa Community College. I asked how AgriVision Equipment could get involved and help."



He threw out the idea of a Precision Ag Expo and the representative jumped on it. "Since we were already doing a similar event at Northwest Missouri State University, we had a model that worked," said Ford. "In the end we took 4-5 sessions from that event and created a shorter one-day event."

Twenty-seven incoming freshman, sophomores and junior high school students attended the inaugural July event. While there wasn't an application process this year, it may be considered as the event grows.

"It was great seeing students excited about ag and embracing tech. Even though it was 98-degrees outside, they were all over it. It was a lot of fun."

"The students really enjoyed the hands-on activities," said Megan Dieken, Northwest Iowa Community College's youth programming event planner. "The 4H and FFA advisors in attendance loved the event and want to come back with more students next year. I love that they were able to attend AgriVision Equipment's presentations so they can start implementing some of the information into their chapter."

She added, "I was blown away by all the information AgriVision Equipment provided. Ag technology has changed so much over the years. It is definitely not behind other industries. My hope is that even kids who don't grow up on a farm may find this to be an avenue worth pursuing. This industry is going to need smart and talented young people moving forward."

A strong team effort helped pull off the event. Northwest Iowa Community College handled the event marketing, logistics and facilities, while AgriVision Equipment provided the equipment (a combine, tractor, planter, sprayer and components), technical experts and financial support.

"We have great connections with local high schools and have the resources, manpower and relationships to help make events like this happen," said Dieken. "We hope to continue this great event that is not only helpful for the students, but a great way for AgriVision Equipment to get in front of FFA and 4H groups as well."

Dieken added, "The staff at AgriVision Equipment were super to work with. We definitely will be extending an invitation to AgriVision Equipment any time we have an opportunity to tie agriculture into one of our events We're looking forward to more partnerships like this down the road."

Ford hopes to conduct more events like these in the future. "Both of these events are a 'win-win' for everyone," exclaimed Ford. "The educational institutions get to talk about themselves and showcase their campuses to students who want to be there, ag leaders and students learn about the latest and greatest precision ag has to offer and we (AgriVision Equipment) get the opportunity to interact with all three groups."

He added, "At the end of the day we recognize that there will be students participating in these events who will go on to work for other brands and dealerships. That doesn't matter to us. The whole point of this academy is to get these high school students excited about agriculture."

"These events are an opportunity for us to get more engaged, not just as a large ag dealer, but as a partner in the community as well," concluded Ford. "They get us out in the community as an ag advocate focused on the long-term future of agriculture."

"This event is truly a collaborative effort. I really commend AgriVision Equipment on the fact that they are not just looking at themselves, but how they can better the ag industry as a whole."
